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### Causative Verbs Have Get Something

We use a causative verb when we want to talk about something that someone else did for us or for another person. It means that the subject caused the action to happen, but didn't do it themselves.

### Causatives: Have and Get - Perfect English Grammar

The English verbs let, make, have, get, and help are called causative verbs because they cause something else to happen. Here are some specific examples of how causative verbs work in English sentences. How to use causative verbs in English LET = permit something to happen. Grammatical structure: LET + PERSON/THING + VERB (base form) Examples:

### Causative Verbs in English: Let, Make, Have, Get, Help ...

There are two forms of doing causative with "have", passive or active. Active Form. Have + somebody + do (verb 1) + something. In active form, we use somebody and base form of the verb (verb 1) after the verb "have"!. Mary had the nurse check her temperature. I must have the mechanic check my car. We've had a web designer make our website. I have the cleaners wash the floor every day.
