What Did the Ancient Greeks Believe In?

Priests simply looked after cults; they did not constitute a clergy, and there were no sacred books. The sole requirements for the Greeks were to believe that the gods existed and to perform ritual and sacrifice, through which the gods received their due. To deny the existence of a deity was to risk reprisals, from the deity or from other mortals.
