Pawnee Bill's Wild West show followed up, in 1905, Within four weeks of the battle, William M. Cary's full-page drawing appeared in New York City's The Daily Graphic. The Battle of Little Bighorn, more commonly known as Custer's Last stand, was fought June 25-26, 1876 between the U.S. 7th Cavalry and the Lakota, Northern Cheyenne, and the Arapaho tribes.
