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Safety Standards And Infection Control

Standard precautions are basic infection prevention and control strategies that apply to everyone, regardless of their perceived or confirmed infectious status. Strategies include hand hygiene, personal protective equipment, cleaning, and appropriate handling and disposal of sharps.

Infection Prevention and Control Systems - Safety and Quality

Infection control in the workplace aims to prevent pathogens from coming into contact with a person in the first place. Employers are obliged under the Occupational Health and Safety Act 2004 to provide a safe workplace for their employees, including the provision of adequate infection control procedures and the right equipment and training.

Promote a safety climate. Develop policies which facilitate the implementation of infection control measures. infection control standard precautions in health care

A range of standards and guidelines support consistent strategies for the prevention and control of healthcare-associated infection across Australia. The National Safety and Quality Health Service (NSQHS) Standards were developed by the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care (ACSQHC) to drive the implementation of safety and quality systems and improve the quality of healthcare in Australia.

The final standard infection control precaution is occupational safety and exposure. Occupational exposure happens when you come into contact with a potentially harmful physical, chemical, or biological agent as a result of your job. Occupational exposure can come from a range of sources in your workplace.

The CDC recommended universal precautions, which is a method of infection control that assumed that all human blood and body fluids were potentially infectious Standard Precautions A set of infection control practices used to prevent transmission of diseases that can be acquired by contact with blood, body fluids, non-intact skin (including rashes), and mucous membranes.
