As adolescents progress through their developmental channels, critical risk factors may come in to play that promote suicidal ideation and transition to suicidal behaviors. 12 Some of these risk factors include history of mental illness or mood disorders, such as depression, a previous suicide attempt, substance abuse, family history of a psychiatric diagnosis or suicide, and involvement in bullying, either as a victim or perpetrator (see Risk factors for suicide in adolescents). 4, 6, 12, 36 ...
