Today, it is part of the Statue of Liberty National Monument, accessible to the public only by ferry.

Ellis Island, however, was open during only a short period in American history. Originally there were no immigration laws. In 1787 the Constitution included a section (Article 1, Section 8) that gave Congress the power to enact naturalization laws. In 1790 a two-year residency requirement was established for citizenship.
